## 4-Year High School Scholarship

The aim of this scholarship is to honor students who embody the values of Oak Grove school and who have strong community-focused interests. Through The Arts of Living and Learning, a framework inspired by the intent and philosophy of our founder J. Krishnamurti, we encourage students to use their minds, their bodies, and their hearts well. The project-based learning, relationships between students, teachers and parents, and the spirit of inquiry at Oak Grove provide a challenging but non-competitive climate for learning.

The Oak Grove High School is strengthened by the continuity of students and families who attend the program for all four years. This is the main condition by which applicants for this scholarship will be considered. Additionally, applicants must be entering 9th grade, demonstrate strong academic ability, and embody the values of Oak Grove school including diversity, compassion, thoughtfulness, awareness, and creativity.

To Apply for the Spirit of Oak Grove Scholarship:

- Complete an online application for Oak Grove School
- Complete the Financial Aid Application
- Submit teacher evaluation forms or community member recommendation and transcripts
- Student: Write a 1-2 page essay describing why you believe an Oak Grove education will benefit both you and our society
- Parents: Write a 1 page narrative on why you have chosen Oak Grove for your student, and how, as a family, you will be a positive addition to the community
- Participate in an Admissions Interview
